## **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course introduces students to literary genres including fiction, poetry, and drama. Students learn the fundamentals of university-level literary study and explore major themes suggested by the selected texts.

### **LEARNING OUTCOMES**

Upon successful completion of the course, students will be able to:

- recognize the basic conventions of the four main genres of literature (short fiction, poetry, the novel, and drama)
- perform post-secondary level analysis of literary texts, including analysis related to issues of class, gender, race, ethnicity, and sexual orientation
- apply standard literary terminology in their discussions of works of literature
- recognize literary devices and motifs, and explain how these contribute to a literary work
- present ideas in well-organized, thoughtful, and polished essays, and do postsecondary level research into literary subjects

#### **COURSE FORMAT**

Classes will all be face-to-face, and Moodle, the online learning management system, will be used extensively. Classes take place at scheduled times for a total of 3 hours per week. Students are expected to attend classes in person: classes will not be recorded.

Each class will consist of a combination of lecture, discussion, group work, and individual activities. **Students** will be expected to read literature outside of class time and come in ready to interact with and make meaning of the readings.

As stated above, in addition to attending mandatory classroom sessions, students are expected to complete readings, view videos and complete assignments on the online platform, Moodle. All writing assignments will be completed outside of scheduled classes. Students should expect to spend at least three to six hours per week outside of class time on assignments and readings.

Students are encouraged to work one-on-one with an instructor and/or a writing coach for the major assignments.

#### **EVALUATION**

Students will write two literary essays (midterm and literary response), worth a combined 30% of the course grade. Each student will also be responsible to fully engage in class discussions (which involves reading PRIOR to classroom time), and to maintain an ongoing reading journal entries for the week's assigned readings. Students will be asked to attend their choice of a literary event during the term (outside of class time) and to present their reflections, analysis and self-evaluation about the event during class time. This project may be done individually or in a pair. There will be a final written project during the final exam period, as well as a midterm essay.

#### \*A note on sources

All words and ideas are meant to reflect your own thoughts and words, using the literature to back up your ideas. You must use text-based evidence for the papers you write: that is, you must cite the original piece of literature you are using. Sources from online essays, written using AI (like Chat GPT) or websites such as freecollegeessays.com will not be accepted as they will not meet assignment intentions. AGAIN: The essay responses are meant to reflect your own ideas/perspectives, words, thoughts and reasoning.

If you have questions about a source you're considering using, just ask me, the writing centre, or the library staff! Please cite any texts you refer to using APA style  $7^{th}$  edition style.
