COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course builds on content from other courses to assist students to explore concepts and care-giving approaches that will allow them to work effectively with individuals experiencing mental health challenges. Emphasis is on recognizing behaviours and identifying personcentred intervention strategies.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of the course, students will:

- Describe ways to organize, administer and evaluate person-centred care and assistance for clients/residents experiencing mental health challenges
- Use an informed problem-solving process when caring for or providing assistance for individuals experiencing mental health challenges
- Identify factors that influence the mental health and well-being of individuals
- Demonstrate an understanding of effective approaches to disruptive or abusive behaviours
- Know when to exit a potentially unsafe situation.

COURSE FORMAT

This course will consist of lectures, group work, learning activities, and may include guest speakers and other methods to optimise learning.

ASSESSMENTS

All evaluative components for this course are mandatory and must have a passing grade (usually a minimum of 50%) in order to receive a passing mark. Missing or incomplete components will result in a course grade assessment of "Fail"

Late Assignments/Work: For every day an assignment *is late* (after assigned due date) **5%** will be deducted from the original paper grade.

No assignment will be accepted more than one week (7 calendar days) following the due date unless arrangements are made with instructor of that specific course <u>in advance of due date</u>. Assignments not handed in one week after due date will receive a 0 (failing) grade.

Course evaluation methods include instructor and student self-assessment. Evaluation Criteria are summarized below.

Attendance and Participation

10%

Attendance means being at class on time every day, prepared for the class and participating to the end of the class. If you cannot be at class, you must notify the instructor in advance and you must arrange to get the class notes and information from your classmates. You are responsible for the information and materials of every class.

Participation includes your active involvement in the activities of the classroom and completion of assignments, reading, quizzes, etc. Coming to class regularly, being on time, being prepared for the class, speaking up in class and handing in your assignments when due will contribute greatly to your success.

Mental Illness Group Assignment

30%

In this assignment, you will work in a small group to choose one of the listed conditions and prepare a class presentation and a written paper that discusses the physical, emotional, social and cognitive challenges faced by a person experiencing the chosen condition. You will identify community resources and discuss the role of the HCA in supporting persons with this mental health disorder.

Quizzes 20%

Quizzes will be completed throughout the course.

Final Exam 40%

The final exam is cumulative and will cover material & information presented in class, the readings and discussions.

NOTE: If a student <u>should fail</u> the final exam a re-write/supplemental exam is <u>not</u> guaranteed, but at the discretion of the instructor
